'For the promotion, advancement and encouragement amongst women of education, whether it be for research and professional activities, or for artistic and creative activities.'

Many thanks to all our supporters and sponsors for helping us achieve our purpose. I am proud to announce that over the last 12 months, The Kate Edger Educational Charitable Trust (KEECT) has provided financial assistance of over \$600,000 to 120 women, from \$2,000 grants assisting awardees to retrain, to \$16,000 post graduate research projects.

The KEECT is named after Kate Edger, who in 1877 became the first woman in New Zealand to gain a university degree. She was a great supporter of the Suffrage Movement and advocated strongly throughout her life for women to use the vote to bring about change and improvement in society.

In this issue of *Empowering through Education* we introduce some of our recent awardees; we celebrate the 125-year anniversary of all New Zealand women gaining the vote with a launch of a Secondary Schools' Suffrage Competition; and we acknowledge Emeritus Professor Dame Charmian O'Connor.

It is a good time to reflect on the meaning of citizenship and political engagement, and to honour the contributions that women make to their families, their communities and to New Zealand society in general.

Having grown up in a low socio-economic area of South Auckland, the Kate Edger Educational Charitable Trust Vinka Marinovich Award in Music holds immense value for me personally and represents a clear path forward. To have financial security for the academic year to come is not something that I take for granted and I am incredibly humbled to be chosen for this award.

More than just the financial security however, this award has assured me that I will be in strong position to pursue my artistic and academic endeavors with full freedom. That is, freedom from the struggle of daily living costs, and freedom to research the current technological landscape for its potential to impact my art.

I study a field of music called Sonic Arts, a small enough area of research that has only begun to flourish in the last 50 years. I find myself as one of the only postgraduate female sonic artists in the University of Auckland, and amongst only a handful of female composers-researchers who have come before me. I am immensely grateful for the generosity of your award for it comes at a crucial time when female artists are ready and able to be recognised for their equal contribution to the Arts in New Zealand.

Finally, what this scholarship represents for me is an opportunity to pursue a path less trodden, not only because I am the first of my family to hold a university degree, but because I am able to explore the arts in a time where this field is continually experiencing a lack of financial support. I thank you for your generous support and hope to continue forging a path forward in both my academic and artistic career.

The University of Auckland Medical School's Wallath Prize is awarded to the students from the Summer Studentship Research programme who submit the top reports for their project. This year, The KEECT was pleased to learn that one of our Summer Studentship Awardees, Jialin Sae-Jiw, received the prize for the biomedical report.

Jialin's research topic was "Can anti-inflammatory medications reduce brain injury after severe foetal asphyxia."

Jialin has also been awarded a KEECT 2018 Post Graduate Diploma to study Bioscience Enterprise at the University of Auckland – we have no doubt we will be hearing more about this talented and ambitious young woman.

In addition, one of our past Tressa Thomas Awardees, Rachel Basevi, was a runner-up in one of the other categories. We are extremely proud of the high calibre of our awardees!

### SHANTI BROWN

### 1877 Commemorative Award

Shanti Brown is the recipient of our KEECT 1877 Commemorative Award, celebrating the 140th anniversary of Kate Edger's BA graduation.

Currently doing her MA in Arts Therapy at Whitecliffe College of Arts and Design, Shanti completed an undergraduate degree in Fine Arts and was looking for an avenue to combine her love of art, her interest in counselling and psychology and her desire to pursue a career 'that was about more than just myself.'

Arts Therapy is a relatively new professional field in New Zealand and Shanti appreciates the Award not only for the financial breathing space it has provided her, but also because it validates her decision to pursue this area of study. She notes that Kate Edger provides a wonderful role model:

"Kate's life, with her balance between study, teaching, social work and family, shows that women don't have to just choose one path, but can have rich and diverse lives."

Shanti is about to commence her clinical practice as part of her degree.

### VERONICA ZOEST

Bachelor with Honours Award

Veronica Zoest was a recipient of a KEECT Bachelor with Honours Award. She was enrolled at the University of Auckland in a Bachelor of Science (Hons) degree, specialising in Microbiology and Immunology. Veronica was part of a research team investigating the use of compounds to inhibit the growth of Mycobacterium tuberculosis, the causative organism in tuberculosis. This is part of the process of developing new drug treatments for a disease that continues to be a major threat to public health globally.

In the future, Veronica hopes to embark upon a PhD in the area of vaccine development. She noted the importance of the Award to her work: "This award helped to ensure that my education and research could be my main focus without the stress of the financing of postgraduate study."

She also referred to the importance of the work The KEECT does in supporting women studying STEM subjects, where women remain underrepresented.

### MARAN GREENWOOD

Tressa Thomas Retraining Award

This award helped support Maran and her whānau during her Midwifery Studies at AUT. Maran was pursuing her long term ambition of becoming a midwife, because of her belief in the importance of supporting women and their families at such a crucial time in their lives:

"I am passionate about the strength and mana women possess and the vital role women play to grow healthy thriving tamariki and whānau."

When her studies are completed, Maran will fulfill her dream by working as a Lead Maternity Carer in her Northland community. She is very grateful to The KEECT, not only for the financial support, but for the confidence the Award gave her to achieve outstanding grades in her final year of study.
